



Securing a Future for Large Carnivores, Together

The Challenge

Large carnivores are in trouble across the globe. Africa's lion population has declined by over 40% in just two decades. The primary drivers are not poaching or overhunting. They are habitat and prey loss, and conflict with people where their ranges overlap. Lion Landscapes works across Rungwa-Ruaha, Selous-Nyerere (Tanzania) and Laikipia (Kenya), covering 80,000+ km² with a team of around 80 people.

Pillar 1: Stop the Loss

We work to stop the direct killing of large carnivores and the loss of prey and habitat through programmes that incentivise sustainable practices, combined with on-the-ground information sharing and support.

Pillar 2: Reduce the Cost

Livestock protection programmes and community-based support networks help people reduce the costs of living alongside large carnivores by protecting lives and livelihoods.

Pillar 3: Increase the Benefits

But reducing the cost of living with large carnivores is not enough. We also develop programmes that link tangible benefits, such as healthcare, veterinary care and better education opportunities, to the presence and conservation of large carnivores
